American Homeownership and Economic Opportunity Act of 2000 signed by the President

The American Homeownership and Economic Opportunity Act of 2000 was signed by the President and became public law on December 27, 2000. This bill offers homeownership assistance for disabled families.

A public housing agency, under Section 8, may provide assistance to a disabled family for the purchase of a home that the disabled family member will own and occupy. The disabled family must meet eligibility requirements of the public housing agency. This bill includes incentives to increase the number of Americans with disabilities who own homes. To find out more about the opportunities this new bill provides, contact your local housing agency.

Computer Classes for Individuals with Disabilities

Coming soon! The United Methodist Church of Whitefish Bay, Wisconsin will offer computer classes for people with disabilities over 18 years of age or their caregivers. The classes, will be offered at the church computer lab, and will be taught by volunteer instructors. While the church and computer lab is accessible, at this time, students must be able to use a keyboard, or mouse and read a computer screen without the use of assistive devices. Classes are intended to provide educational development, social stimulation and personal growth experiences.

Beginning the week of June 5, 2001, classes will meet once a week for six weeks for a nominal fee of \$30.00. The computer lab will host an open house on Wednesday, May 16, 2001 at 7:15 p.m.

The Challenge Project is on its way

The Challenge Project, in affiliation with the Wisconsin Lake Schooner Education Association, is a project that has recently been picking up steam. A traditionally rigged tall ship will be built to offer people disabilities with the opportunity experience adventure education aboard an accessible vessel. People of all ages, backgrounds and abilities will be brought together with a common purpose. Aboard the Challenge, the focus will be on learning from sailing rather than learning how to sail. Each member of the crew must act independently and yet interdependently.

The vessel is currently in the concept phase of development. Money is being raised to further the design specifications, to support summer pilot programs and to develop interest across the country.
