EEOC announces small business workshops

U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC), as part of President Bush's New Freedom Initiative, has announced a series of free, nationwide workshops designed to educate small business leaders on the employment of people with disabilities.

The free workshops, aimed at encouraging businesses with 15 to 100 employees to hire individuals with disabilities, will focus on the benefits of hiring people with disabilities and will cover such issues as interviewing, reasonable accommodations, recruitment and tax incentives. The workshops will also discuss the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Disability Mentoring Day, coming soon to a workplace near you

"Disability Mentoring Day: Career Development for the 21st Century," is a nationwide event scheduled to take place on Wednesday, October 16, 2002. The event, designed to bring people with disabilities into the workplace to learn more about their chosen career field from business mentors, will kick off a year round employment initiative.

According to the day's national sponsor, the American Association of People with Disabilities (AAPD), this event is designed to fulfill four main goals:

- Career Planning for people with disabilities
- Empowerment of people with disabilities to tap into and take advantage of employment opportunities
- Recruitment of people with disabilities as potential job candidates
- Education of employers on the importance of including people with disabilities in their diversity initiatives

According to a recent Harris Survey of Americans with Disabilities, 2 of 3 (67%) people with disabilities capable of and willing to work are unemployed. People with disabilities continue to be the one demographic group with the highest unemployment rate.

Employers – it is time to tap into the vast talents of employees with disabilities. Now is the time to step forward and dare to change the startling reality of unemployment affecting so many people with disabilities. Grant improves access to employment services for people with disabilities

Governor Scott McCallum announced that the State of Wisconsin has been awarded a \$700,000 grant from the United States Department of Labor for the purposes of enhancing employment opportunities for residents with disabilities. The grant will be used to strengthen the services offered at Wisconsin's 78 employment centers for people with disabilities.

The new funding will not only enhance the centers' ability to meet the varied needs of people with disabilities, but will also be used to educate employers on the value of hiring people with disabilities.

Wisconsin based accessibility codes

Wisconsin has adopted new code requirements for Accessibility in Commercial Buildings. The new code requirements call for increased adaptability, usability and accessibility in new multi-family construction, making it easier for a renter to make architectural modifications to their living space. Additionally, as of July 1, 2002, a renter may request lever plumbing controls or lever door handles for their dwelling at the owner's expense. In this regard, The Rep has developed a number of Access Services designed to enhance select performances for those with disabilities.

The following Access Services are available for all Quadracci Powerhouse Theater and Stiemke Theater productions:

Written Script Synopsis available in large type.

Audio Script Synopsis including program notes and the cast list.

Alternative-print Performance Programs available in large type.

Infrared Listening Systems ensure clarity of sound from any seat in the house. Headsets are available at the House Manager's desk before each performance.

Sign Language Interpreted Performances: Each Theater will feature a performance interpreted in American Sign Language (ASL). When ordering your ticket, please alert the Ticket Office staff that you would like to sit in the Interpreted section.

The following are available only in the Quadracci Powerhouse Theater:

Captioned Theater is offered on the closing Sunday matinee performance of each Quadracci Powerhouse production. Patrons can watch the performance while viewing a screen that displays the actors' lines as they are spoken.

Audio Description: Each Quadracci production includes two audio-described performances. Using an earpiece attached to a small handheld receiver, patrons hear a live, real-time description of the action on stage.

Additionally, all of The Rep's Theaters are wheelchair accessible and welcoming to service animals. All of The Rep's Access Services are offered to patrons free of charge.
